

## VIEWPOINT from your Business Manager Doug McKay

Whith our Local 258 IBEW members working across British Columbia (and elsewhere!) in Electric Utility, Power Line, Traffic Control, Utility Arborist, and Electrical Manufacturing, it's good when we can get together and talk about our union, the issues we face in the workplace and about those circumstances that affect us as working people.

That was the case in November when almost 100 Shop Stewards gathered in Burnaby, BC for our union's "Defining Our Future" Conference. It was a jam packed agenda that also provided an opportunity to meet and get to know one another. Many members travelled from the North, the Interior, the Kootenays and the Island to listen to a wide variety of speakers and enjoy some good IBEW hospitality. It was a pleasure, and an honour, to co-MC the proceedings with Brother Tony Brand and I thank all of you who participated in this important event. I'd also like to thank our guest speakers for taking the time to share their expertise with our membership.

Sometimes in this job, one is called upon to talk with the media about something that has come to their attention. I always speak openly and freely with anyone who calls me - including every one of our members who can, at any time, pick up the phone and call me directly. It's unfortunate when media reporters take things out of context, don't understand unions and don't gain an understanding about the industries we work in. Recently, that very situation came home to roost. There was an article printed in a local community newspaper that twisted and ignored some of the important facts I discussed with a reporter and ultimately the article may have presented the wrong impression and offended some of our members. Please be assured this was never my intent and I take my role as your Business Manager very seriously and will always defend our members to the best of my ability, no matter who their employer is. Our union and our members always come first and it is my job to do everything in my power to make sure you have good representation in the workplace, decent wages, safe and fair working conditions and as much job security that is possible.

As we start 2014, contract negotiations are filling the calendar. Many thanks to our members working at our signatory Line Contractor companies - Brother Paul Davis and Brother Jim Leckie from Allteck and Brother Henry Bender from Arctic Arrow - along with ABMs Dan Giesbrecht and Don McNabb - who reached a new agreement ratified by a margin of 75% of members voting at the end of February.

Bargaining for our members working at BC Hydro gets underway in mid-March and I'd like to thank our members who have stepped forward for this round of negotiations. We have reviewed the contract proposals our members at BC Hydro have

put forward and I'd like to thank everyone who participated with sending in your suggestions and (sometimes very creative) ideas.

We continue to organize members working in the Traffic Control sector and welcome them to Local 258 IBEW. We are also dealing with all the changes that this industry undergoes, and how it affects our members, in what seems like a weekly, if not daily, basis. Local 258 has been a proud participant since it's inception of the "The Cone Zone" safety initiative being put forward by the Workers Compensation Board that encourages drivers to slow down in areas where Traffic Control personnel are working. We are glad to be able to share our experiences with this working group.

I'd like to take this opportunity to encourage all of you to consider getting more involved with your union. With our union elections on the horizon, we are always open to members stepping forward to participate at a different level with our Unit Executive and Table Officers positions. You should have received a letter in the mail last month outlining the dates for nominations and procedures for our 2014 union election and I encourage you to attend your union meeting to find out more information.

Given that we still do communicate by mail – at least for as long as Canada Post is willing to provide mail service to Canadians – please make sure your mailing address and contact information is current with Local 258 IBEW. It is your responsibility to let us know if you have an address change as we do send important information to you in the mail, such as your receipts for union dues for income tax purposes. You can update your address by signing up as a member on our website at www.ibew258.bc.ca or call the office directly at 604-520-3305 or toll free 1-877-520-3305 during regular business hours.

Local 258 IBEW offers a Dispatch service for members who are unemployed and are eligible to work (via their trade qualifications) with BC Hydro and Local 258's outside line contractors.

Members are not allowed to accept jobs directly from employers hiring Local 258 members without first obtaining clearance from Dispatch. If you look for work with a Local 258 employer and are hired without getting clearance from Dispatch at Local 258, you may be pulled from the job and fined by the union.

#### To be eligible for dispatch, please note the following:

It is up to each Local 258 member to sign up to the dispatch list as soon as you are unemployed. Do not delay, as this will affect your standing on the list. Members are called out to work based on a combination of criteria, including trade qualification, union seniority and date of when you called Dispatch to register.

#### Procedure for Placement on the Local 258 Dispatch List:

- 1. Your membership in Local 258 must be current you must be an Active Member with membership dues paid and up-to-date.
- 2. It is helpful if you submit a resume including your qualifications and work history, copies of trades qualifications and/or tickets you have. If you are a Journeyman, you must have an Interprovincial

Red Seal for applicable trades only.

- 3. We must have your current contact information, including phone number and full mailing address. Please update your contact information on a regular basis if there are changes, as this impacts our ability to provide you with work opportunities.
- 4. You must provide copies of your current regular and/or special drivers license.

Please send all of the above required documents - resume, current contact information, copies of trade certificates and drivers licenses PLUS A CHEQUE FOR **\$62.50** - via regular mail to IBEW Local 258, ATTENTION: DISPATCH, 7535 Sixth Street, Burnaby, BC V3N 3M2. If you live in the lower mainland area, you can personally deliver these documents directly to the Dispatch office at the union's headquarters.

## 2014 gets underway with major bargaining

Starting off a busy year of bargaining, Local 258 IBEW members working for Line Contractor companies have ratified a new collective agreement by a margin of 75% after a mail ballot vote was counted at the end of February.

"Thanks to the Bargaining Committee members representing Local 258 members working at our signatory Line Contractor companies who worked very hard to reach this new agreement," said Local 258 IBEW Business Manager Doug McKay.

The new four-year agreement features increases in wages and living out allowances, as well as 100% employer paid costs for personal protective equipment required on-the job.

Members of the Line Contractors Bargaining Committee were Brother Dan Giesbrecht and Brother Don McNabb, Local 258 IBEW ABMs; Brother Paul Davis and Brother Jim Leckie from Allteck and Brother Henry Bender from Arctic Arrow.

Contract negotiations for members work-

ing at BC Hydro, one of the largest sectors of members in Local 258, are now getting underway. The union Bargaining Committee has already met and reviewed the contract proposals from the membership and the first set of talks are scheduled for mid-March.

Leading negotiations is Business Manager McKay, who has put together a team from across the province to work with Garnet Zimmerman of GZ Mediation, a successful professional negotiator who has previously worked with Local 258. Bargaining for a new contract with BC Hydro is negotiated through the Public Sector Employers Council (PSEC).

The current BC Hydro agreement expires at the end of March. "As BC Hydro is a Crown Corporation, and with the current Minister of Energy Bill Bennett undertaking a "core review", we are preparing for any surprise that may be coming our way," says McKay.

Other contracts set to expire this year are in the union's Utility Arborist, Traffic Control and Manufacturing sectors.

The Public Sector Employers' Council (PSEC) supports government in setting and coordinating strategic directions in human resource management and labour relations for the broad public sector. PSEC is also active in the area of public sector pension plan management. PSEC's authority related to labour relations is contained in the Public Sector Employers Act. This authority includes administering and managing the development and implementation of labour relations policies and practices in the B.C. public sector. ## **Local 258 IBEW holds successful Shop Stewards Conference**

Local 258 IBEW Shop Stewards travelled from across British Columbia to attend the "Defining Our Future" Conference, and, from all reports, the weekend event that took place in November 2013 can only be described as a complete success!

Doug McKay, Business Manager of Local 258 IBEW, co-emceed the event with union president Tony Brand and was impressed with the turnout of almost 100 Shop Stewards.

"We had a good turnout and it was an honour to share the weekend with our front line activists," says McKay. "Their dedication and commitment to their brothers and sisters in the workplace is commendable and we appreciate the efforts they put forth on a daily basis."

# Bill to help tradespeople defeated by majority Conservatives

Bill C-201, a Private Member's Bill that would allow tradespersons and apprentices to deduct travel and accommodation expenses from their taxable income so they could secure and maintain employment at a construction site that is more than 80 kilometres away from their home was <u>defeated</u> by the Harper majority Conservative government by a vote of 149 to 126 on February 5, 2014, when Parliament resumed after the Christmas break.

Introduced by NDP MP Chris Charlton (Hamilton Mountain), the Bill was supported by labour organizations across Canada and by thousands who signed petitions favouring this important legislation. IBEW Local 568 Business Manager Laurent Talbot (Quebec) was quoted as saying "The math is simple. More tradespeople working equals a lower unemployment rate".

Conservative MP Dave Van Kesteren (Chatham-Kent-Essex) said, "It is a costly and flawed piece of legislation that could expose Canada's tax system to a high likelihood of abuse."

In other words, tradespeople can't be trusted.

As a result, out-of-work tradespeople will have to continue to finance their own travel and accommodation should they wish to move to another region for work.

# "Attack on Workers" Bill C-525 makes it's way through Parliament

With the majority of Members of Parliament belonging to the Conservative Party, another Private Member's Bill, C-525, introduced by Alberta Conservative MP Blaine Calkins, passed First Reading and headed to the Standing Committee on Human Resources where a number of amendments were put forward.

This Bill, first reported on in the last issue of the Hotline, is erroneously titled the "Employees' Voting Rights Act", and is strategically aimed at making changes to the Federal Labour Code that include making it extremely difficult for workers to organize unions in their workplaces and easier for unionized workers to decertify from their union.

Seen as "destabilizing labour relations" and "yet another way to erode the civilized power relationship between employers and unions", Bill C-525 was amended by the Committee after witness appearances that featured Hassan Yussuff, Secretary-Treasurer of

the Canadian Labour Congress, and pointed questions from NDP MP Jinny Sims (Newton-North Delta).

Lise St. Denis, a Liberal MP from Saint Maurice-Champlain, Quebec said: The Conservatives are redefining labour relations using a restrictive vision of the freedom of association as recognized by the charter.

Committee member Elizabeth May, the Green Party MP from Saanich–Gulf Islands, said, "There is the old adage, "If it ain't broke, don't fix it". This is one of a number of Private Members' Bills, and some government bills, that aim directly at collective bargaining, as they have to other sectors, and say, "We're going to keep fixing it 'til it's broken".

# Canadian Labour Congress says government abandoning the middle class

Ken Georgetti, the President of the Canadian Labour Congress, says the federal budget lacks any vision about how to stop growing inequality and the economic slide of middle class Canadians.

Ken Georgetti was commenting on the 2014-15 budget tabled in the House of Commons on Tuesday, February 11. "Canadians wanted a budget that speaks to their real needs, but the Finance Minister is more interested in continuing with austerity and balancing the budget. If now is not the time to act, when will it be?"

Georgetti says the budget makes noises about protecting consumers and their pocketbooks, and it devotes some money to job training. "The Minister is just tinkering around the edges. We have almost three million Canadians who are either unemployed, stuck in part-time jobs, or who have given up looking for work altogether. This budget does little to deal with that great waste of talent and skill."

Georgetti says that Ottawa has chosen to slash public services in order to pay for the deep corporate tax cuts it had made over the years. "In return for tax breaks business was supposed to invest in the economy, but the evidence shows that they are instead hoarding mountains of cash and paying their CEOs fat salaries."

He adds, "People are having trouble making ends meet and they fear especially for the future of their children and grandchildren. Good, family-supporting jobs are the key to Canada's economic success and we cannot get there with corporate tax cuts and government austerity. Canadians want a government that is committed to fairness and that is not what they are getting in the budget. It's time for a new vision."

### "Anti-union" Bill C-377: In the Senate... again

Private Members' Bill C-377 (Conservative MP Russ Hiebert, South Surrey-White Rock-Cloverdale), commonly referred to as the "anti-union Bill" that unfairly seeks to impose rules on unions that are much more detailed and restrictive than any other organization must follow and has been described as a deeply flawed piece of legislation that singles out unions to provide detailed and intrusive reports to the Canada Revenue Agency, has been adjourned to the next sitting of the Senate.



## RUMINATIONS OF A RETIREE

If I ever purchase another vehicle it will be one that I can reach the roof of with both feet firmly on the ground and not have to swing precariously from the top of an 8 foot step ladder. But I digress. Actually, I digress a lot but I am entitled to because of age and seniority. Let's see, where was I? Oh yeah, we were talking about tomorrows. So, as it happens, today is the tomorrow that I deferred the writing of this column to. I always try to accomplish one productive task per day. I am quite dutiful about limiting the production to one per day. To do any more would just raise expectations with Catherine Dear and put the aforementioned code in jeopardy. Now I grant that this writing may not be deemed by all as productive but I will still feel righteous upon its completion and will record it as my productive task for the day.

Yesterday, while perched on the top of the 8 foot step ladder, washing the camper, I felt a twinge or two of guilt. See, Jerry Brown, the governor of California, has been on the TV exhorting Californians to reduce water usage by 20% to alleviate the effects of the drought. Apparently it is the worst drought that current Californians can remember. To assuage somewhat my feelings of guilt, and to make up for the water used in camper washing, I resolved to forgo showering and shaving for several days and to flush the toilet less often. Anyway, while balancing on the ladder and being miserly with the water, I got to ruminating about water usage in this particular area.

The Coachella Valley is a desert. Deserts by definition have a dearth of water. People flock to the desert for the sunshine. The first thing developers do when developing in the desert is construct lakes. There is a housing development near to us where the developer dug a great hole in the desert and filled it with water so that residents could water ski. Another development started by digging an even larger hole, filling it with water and selling water-front lots complete with little boats to float around in. There is a

local major hotel that conducts tours of it's facility by little boats on a manmade lake. A shopping mall in the Valley, "The River" by name, has constructed a (you probably guessed it) river so that shoppers can enjoy their lattes and other coffee drinks in proximity to a rippling body of water. Which method is better, an across-the-board increase where everybody receives the same amount or a percentage increase where those at higher wage rates receive more than those at lower wage rates? Maybe we'll leave that discussion for another day and get back to tipping. I personally think that the custom of tipping has been distorted from acknowledging good service to providing a subsidy that allows payment of sub-standard wage rates. One also has to be careful and read the bill when presented. I was at one restaurant where, in small print at the bottom of the bill, it announced that an 18% gratuity had already been included. And how about some of those coffee places where there is a goldfish bowl on the counter with a sign that reads "Tip Jar"? What's that all about? How much do you need to tip a guy for handing you a paper cup of coffee across a counter? Oops, look at that. I am right out of space. We can talk more about tipping later. I also wanted to talk about stray dogs, oil pipelines, tankers and job creation. Perhaps we can do that next time.

Please continue to work and play safely because retirement is a goal worth achieving.



Injured workers can now file time-loss claims more quickly and easily through the WCB's Teleclaim Contact Centre.

Workers who are injured at work and miss time as a result can report their injuries to WorkSafe BC by calling the Teleclaim Centre.

By doing so, you will be connected with a WCB representative who completes an injury report on your behalf.

The Teleclaim representative will help explain the claims process in an average 30 minute discussion, and can help obtain services to assist with recovery and return to work.

Teleclaim is available to workplaces throughout BC, Monday though Friday, from 8 am to 6 pm.



## **Notice of Nomination for Election of Officers**

In accordance with the IBEW Constitution and Local 258 Bylaws, the nominations for Officers and Unit Officers will be held at the regular meetings around the province during the month of March, 2014.

At these meetings, the Unit Chair will suspend the regular order of business to declare a "Special Order of Business" to accept nominations for the 2014 Union Elections. No member shall be nominated for more than one office. If a member is nominated for more than one office, he/she will immediately declare for which office he/she will be a candidate.

Article III, Section 4(b) of our bylaws outlines that the person being nominated does not have to be present at the meeting when he/she is nominated, but MUST have provided the Unit Recorder written evidence that he/she is willing to stand for a specific position.

No member shall be eligible for Local Union Office unless he/she has been a member in good standing of Local Union 258 for at least two years immediately prior to the nomination. To be eligible to run for Unit Office, one must have been a member in continuous good standing for at least six months in that Unit. Members from one Unit may nominate members of another Unit for Local Union Office.

Any member nominated can withdraw his/her name at any time prior to election by announcement at the nomination meeting or by notification in writing to the Local Union President. Nominated candidates may prepare a summary of their history as per the IBEW Constitution. This summary must be in the hands of the Election Board no later than April 16, 2014.

All voting shall be by mail ballot. The ballots shall be mailed to each member eligible to vote on April 28, 2014. The ballots shall be counted on June 2, 2014 in the Union Office in Burnaby starting at 8:30 am. Candidates for Union Offices (except Local Union Executive Board) must receive a majority of votes cast. If a majority of votes is not received by a candidate then a run-off election shall be held between the two candidates receiving the most votes. This run-off election shall be counted on June 30, 2014 at the Union Office in Burnaby starting at 8:30 am. Candidates for Unit Offices shall be decided by the candidate receiving the most votes.


