VIEWPOINT from your Business Manager Doug McKay

There are many times we do our jobs under some truly daunting circumstances. For our members who have to work directly with the public, it's important to remember that we are the best at what we do – from our work in electric utility to trimming trees and vegetation to directing and protecting drivers – and what we do, how well we do it and how we present ourselves in the public contributes to the perception of our Union, the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.

As we head into bargaining a new collective agreement with our biggest signatory employer, BC Hydro, it's helpful to remember that almost all the work our members do depends on our publicly-owned BC Hydro and Power Authority. It's the crown corporation that provides work for our members who are directly employed by the utility and also controls almost all of the supplier contracts for the private power line, traffic control, utility arborist and electrical manufacturing companies where we work.

One of the key components to successful bargaining, under normal circumstances, is public support. If the general public "feels" our jobs and the work we do are worthy of fair wages, that support can go a long way in our ability to make gains at the bargaining table.

Under the 16-year reign of the BC Liberals, we consistently had our hands tied in being able to freely negotiate as various "mandates" (2010 Net Zero Mandate; 2012 Cooperative Gains Mandate; 2014 Economic Stability Mandate) resulted in limitations to our ability to achieve what our members wanted, needed and deserved. But we have always done our best under the circumstances and appreciate your support in what we've been able to deliver.

With a new NDP-led government now in place, we are beginning to see signs of improved support for the 326,000 publicsector and additional unionized workers in our province. But at the same time, it appears the upcoming rounds of public sector bargaining will be subjected to the "2019 Sustainable Services Mandate" – details of which right now are not available.

We will continue to follow this closely.



This double issue of the Hotline has been a long time in the making as our attention has been consumed by preparing and delivering our well-attended Shop

Stewards Conference last year, and by numerous other important membership events and tasks that have taken our Editor away from being able to get the magazine "out the door". With this issue, I'd also like to acknowledge the work of and thank Brother Ken McEwen, who has penned a total of 51 submissions for the "Ruminations" column over the years and wish him well in his continued retirement.

We have tried to catch up with all the news since our last issue and have supplemented many articles with additional information you can access by logging in to your union's website at <u>www.ibew258.bc.ca</u>.

I recommend you register to gain access to the passwordprotected Member Resource side of our website as we will be featuring timely information about upcoming events such as the municipal elections taking place this fall with voting day on October 20, as well as member specific information on helping you decipher the Proportional Representation ballot that will be arriving in your mailbox from the government this fall.

Website registration also gets you on the e-mail news blast list that is sent out on a regular basis and includes a reminder of the upcoming union meetings in your area.

I'd like to acknowledge the retirement of Brother Bill Daniels as our International Vice President of the First District Canada and thank him, on behalf of our membership, for his years of dedication and



hard work representing IBEW members across this country. At the same time, I would like to welcome Brother Tom Reid as the new IVP for the First District, appointed by the International Executive Council, and I look forward to the continuation of the strong leadership we have at the Executive level in our Union.



Our Local recently hosted a gathering of IBEW leaders from across Canada who have been meeting on a regular basis as part of the Canadian Utilities Safety Program that focuses on safe work practices in outside utility and electric utility work performed by our members. I'd like to thank these 40 delegates who joined us in Burnaby for two full days of focused talks, including Brother David Mullen, the IBEW Director of *(cont'd on next page)*

Safety and Health who delivered vital information and stats the International has been formulating and collecting pertaining to safety issues across the membership. And, I think I can speak on behalf of everyone at the CUSP meeting when I say we sincerely appreciate the experienced leadership of Brother Steve Hayes from Local 37 in New Brunswick who has been serving as Chair of this important Committee since its' inception many years ago. Steve served as the President of Local 37 until he was recently defeated in their union elections.

Speaking of union elections - I would like to thank all of our Local 258 members who participated in our Local's recent elections, either by stepping forward to run or through sending in your ballot. But I can't let this opportunity pass by ignoring the low level of participation. It seems our membership reflects the poor voter turnout that exists in many municipal elections with less than 25% of people voting. I'd like to hear from any member who is interested in writing to me about why they didn't take the opportunity to vote and what we, as your Union, can do to improve participation. If you didn't vote, you can't really complain, but I'd like to hear from you nonetheless.



This issue of the Hotline includes our annual "In Memoriam" feature that acknowledges and lists the names of our members who passed the previous year. Experiencing the loss of a Union brother or sister is hard on everyone who knew or worked with them. Recently I have joined with members at a number of well-attended memorial services where the camaraderie, fellowship, care and concern we are known for as members of "the Union of Hearts and Minds" was in full display. I salute the thoughtfulness and expres-

sions of respect and compassion by our Union brothers and sisters at the difficult time of grief and loss of one of our own.

In closing, and continuing on the theme of loss, another Day of Mourning has come and gone and workers killed or injured on the job continue to be reported. I was encouraged by the Honourable Harry Bains, MLA for Surrey-Newton who spoke at our Shop Stewards Conference last November and told delegates, "My goal as Minister of Labour is to make workplaces in BC the safest in the country."

Let's help him do that by each of us doing all we can to help each other be safe at work. \swarrow

Congratulations to Paralympian Brother Curt Minard!



Before departing Canada to compete in the 2018 Paralympics Games in South Korea, Brother Curt Minard stopped in at the Local 258 IBEW office in Burnaby to thank his Union for supporting his journey to qualify for a spot on the team. He presented Brother Doug McKay, the Local's Business Manager, with a custom snowboard emblazoned with the Local 258 and IBEW logos in honour of the Union's support.

Curt's exciting performance in the Games was filled with everything you could imagine – speed, thrills, a spectacular crash – and for all the Local 258 IBEW members watching back in Canada, pride in seeing one of our own members on the world stage! Curt achieved 6th place in Snowboard Cross and 8th in Bank Slalom.

"We are very proud of Curt and how far he has come since being seriously injured in an electrical contact accident at work 10 years ago," said Brother McKay. "It's obviously been a very difficult journey and he has shown strength, courage and tenacity in moving forward on multiple fronts."

While working as a PLT for BC Hydro in Invermere, Brother Minard lost his lower left arm and hand when they had to be amputated as a result of a workplace accident that sent 14,400 volts of electricity through his body. "I was also left with damage to my right arm. These were devastating injuries that almost killed me," said Brother Minard.

What followed were years of surgeries, physiotherapy treatments and dealing with the heavy mental challenges and difficulties with coming to terms with what happened and trying to regain his identity.

Today Curt is recognized as an international snowboard athlete. He continues to compete and most recently took 1st place at the Canadian Nationals for the third year in a row. Besides his full time job at BC Hydro in Vernon, he also owns his own motivational speaking company, was recently recognized at the Saskatchewan legislature and was awarded North Okanagan Athlete of the Year.

Local 258 IBEW Dispatch Services

Local 258 IBEW offers a Dispatch service for members who are unemployed and are eligible to work (via their trade qualifications) with BC Hydro and the union's signatory outside line contractors.

Local 258 IBEW members are NOT allowed to accept jobs <u>directly</u> from employers without first obtaining clearance from Dispatch. If you look for work with a Local 258 IBEW employer and are hired without obtaining clearance from Dispatch at Local 258, you may be pulled from the job and fined by the union.

To be eligible for Dispatch, please note the following:

It is up to each Local 258 IBEW member to register with Dispatch as soon as you are unemployed. Do not delay, as this will affect your standing on the list. Members are called out to work based on a combination of criteria, including trade qualification, union seniority and date of when you registered with Dispatch.

Procedure for placement on the Local 258 Dispatch List:

1. Your membership in Local 258 IBEW must be current - you must be an Active Member with membership dues paid and up-to-date.

2. It is helpful if you submit a resume including your qualifications and work history, copies of trades qualifications and/or tickets you

have. If you are a Journeyman, you must have an Interprovincial Red Seal for applicable trades only.

3. We must have your current contact information, including phone number and full mailing address. Please update your contact information on a regular basis if there are changes, as this impacts our ability to provide you with work opportunities.

4. You must provide copies of your current regular and/or special drivers license.

Please send all of the above required documents - resume, current contact information, copies of trade certificates and drivers licenses PLUS A CHEQUE FOR **\$68.50** - via regular mail to IBEW Local 258, ATTENTION: DISPATCH, 7535 6th Street, Burnaby, BC V3N 3M2. If you live in the lower mainland area, you can personally deliver these documents directly to the Dispatch office at the union's headquarters.

Members who were elected or acclaimed in the recent Union elections were sworn in by IBEW International Rep Laird Cronk to serve the four-year term.

"I would like to thank the membership who voted in our recent union election and in the run-off election," said Business Manager Doug McKay. "And I am looking forward to serving our members, who work hard every day across British Columbia and in the Yukon Territory, for the next four years."

Master Line Agreement ratified

Ballots and details of a tentative agreement were mailed at the end of June to over 800 members working at private power line companies under the Master Line Agreement that expired at the end of January this year.

Returned ballots were counted at the Union office in Burnaby on Friday, July 27, 2018, and members voted in favour of the new collective agreement.

Highlights of the new four-year agreement include wage increases across all classifications as well as increases to Living Out Allowances (LOA), for travel and accommodation and to RRSP contributions.

Brother Dan Giesbrecht, Assistant Business Manager reports that these rounds of bargaining were very difficult as the style and composition of the employer's bargaining team changed as a result of the disbanding of the Line Contractors Association since the last contract was negotiated.

Brother Giesbrecht would like to thank the members of the bargaining team for their hard work on these negotiations: Brother Dustin Paloposki, RS Line Construction; Brother Darren Van Leeuwen, Allteck Line Contractors; Brother Jae Haines, Glenn Power Contractors; Brother Pat Hagel, Arctic Arrow Powerline Group; and, Garnet Zimmerman of GMZ Mediation.

First collective agreement signed with our newest members at LaneSafe Traffic Control

Local 258 IBEW welcomes new members working at LaneSafe Traffic Control based in Langley who ratified their first collective agreement earlier this year after negotiations resulted in a 4-year contract featuring wage increases in each year. The Union would like to recognize and thank Sister Kristina Henson who helped work on these negotiations.

Currently there are about 20 members working as Traffic Control Persons and Lane Closure Technicians at LaneSafe. Members can now download their collective agreement from the union's website by logging in and selecting Contracts/Collective Agreements under Member Resources.

Wage improvements highlight ratified agreements for members

With a number of collective agreements expiring over the past 18 months, Local 258 IBEW has been busy with many rounds of bargaining. Sister Nicole Biernaczyk, ABM, reports current negotiations are ongoing or about to begin for the following certifications:

- All Clear Traffic Control
- Walk the Line
- Ace Traffic Control
- Code Manufacturing

New collective agreements have been ratified at each of the following companies by member mail ballot votes, and your Union would like to thank each of you for your participation.

Traffic Control Sector

Cariboo Power Flagging – A new name and a new owner for this previous certification with Power Flagging Northern Division. The new three-year contract, ratified by members working at this traffic control company earlier this year, features wage increases and new language concerning discrimination and harassment as well as termination and discipline. For the first time, matching RRSP contributions by the employer have also been negotiated.

Local 258 IBEW member Sue Gunn is the new owner and has taken over management of this company. The Union would like to recognize and thank Sister Gunn for her many years of service with the Union.

Valley Traffic Systems Inc. – A new 5-year collective agreement was ratified earlier this year by members working at Valley Traffic based in Langley that features wage improvements including for training. Further gains include sick days, new language concerning discrimination and harassment as well as termination and discipline. For the first time, matching RRSP contributions by the employer have also been negotiated. The Union would like to recognize and thank Sister Vicki Flett for her assistance with these negotiations. This contract expires in 2022.

24/7 Traffic Control – A new three-year contract with 24/7 Traffic Control based out of Kelowna, BC, was ratified by members, signed by the Union and then approved by the International in early 2017. The Union would like to recognize and thank Sister Carrie Fillingham for her work on these negotiations.

GOtraffic Management – A new four-year agreement was ratified in February by members working at GOtraffic Management featuring wage improvements. Bargaining achieved new language concerning discrimination, harassment, termination and discipline. For the first time, sick days as well as matching RRSP contributions by the employer have also been negotiated. The Union would like to recognize and thank Sister Dayna Gill for her work with these negotiations. This contract expires in 2022.

Streetwise Traffic Controllers – Members working at Streetwise Traffic Controllers based out of Chilliwack ratified a new 5-year agreement that includes significant wage increases, new language concerning discrimination and harassment as well as

termination and discipline. For the first time, sick days as well as matching RRSP contributions by the employer have also been negotiated. The Union would like to recognize and thank Sister Sharon Maher and Sister Heather Stevens for their work with this round of bargaining. This contract expires in 2023.

Island Traffic Services – ABM Dan Klassen reports a new 4-year agreement was ratified last fall by members working in traffic control at Island Traffic Services on Vancouver Island.

The protracted rounds of difficult negotiations since the previous contract expired in 2016 resulted in wage increases in each of the last three years of the agreement. Members also achieved improvements to bereavement leave, as well as the addition contract clauses covering jury duty leave, compassionate care leave, parental leave and family responsibility leave. Members also received a signing bonus.

Manufacturing Sector

Eaton Industries – Members ratified a new 4-year contract last year at this electrical manufacturing company located in Delta. Negotiations achieved wage improvements of 8.25% over the term of the agreement, increases to safety shoe allowances, an additional sick day, and increases in the employer's contribution to the health & welfare plan and to the Joint Electrical Pension Plan. The Union would like to recognize and thank Brother Orlando Tagaca for his assistance and support with these negotiations, led by ABM Biernaczyk.

NCS International Co. – Last year, members working at NCS International in Coquitlam who manufacture electrical supplies bargained a new collective agreement featuring wage increases including an increased premium for members with a First Aid certificate. Sister Biernaczyk, ABM and lead negotiator, would like to recognize and thank Brother Andrew Robertson for his assistance with these negotiations. This contract expires in 2020.

Harbourview Electric – Bargaining took place for a new collective agreement last year for members working at Harbourview Electric in Burnaby. Local 258 IBEW members working at this company manufacture electrical panels. Wage increases were achieved at 2%/year over the 5-year agreement and improvements to contract language concerning vacation pay was won. Brother Jeff McGiffin assisted with these negotiations but no longer works at this company. This contract expires in 2021.

Miscellaneous Sector

Power Earth Management – Negotiations achieved a new collective agreement ratified by members working at Power Earth Management based out of Langley. Signed in 2017, the four-year agreement features wage increases in the last 3 years of 2% per

Definitions

• COLLECTIVE AGREEMENT

A contract (agreement and contract are interchangeable terms) between one or more unions, acting as bargaining agent, and one or more employee covering wages, hours, working conditions, fringe benefits, rights of workers and union, and procedures to be followed in settling disputes and grievances.

• BARGAINING

Method of determining wages, hours and other conditions of employment through direct negotiations between the union and employer.

NEGOTIATIONS

Discussion between labour and management representatives - called negotiations - with respect to Collective Agreements, settlement of employees' grievances, or arbitration of labour disputes.

RATIFICATION

An act of formal approval given to terms negotiated in collective bargaining by the union members or employer who have the authority to make the final decision of acceptance or rejection. The act of ratification validates the agreement entered into by the negotiators on behalf of all employees in the bargaining unit.

year, including increases to premiums paid to members with Level II & Level III first aid certificates. The Union would like to recognize and thank former employee Brother Morgan Heister who assisted with these negotiations.

Members at Davey Tree bargain a new collective agreement

Local 258 members working for Davey Tree Expert Co. of Canada who provide tree and vegetation trimming services to BC Hydro, ratified a new collective agreement late last year.

ABM Dan Klassen reports that negotiations resulted in wage increases of 2% in each year of the three-year agreement. Highlights include increases to living out and meal allowances, and increases to vision care.

Members work at Davey Tree as groundmen, sawman/ slasher, equipment driver/operator, herbicide applicator, and as Utility Arborist Journeyman and Apprentices.

Brother Klassen would like to thank Brother Devon Nye, who works at Davey Tree, for his assistance with these negotiations. This contract expires in 2020.

Local 258 IBEW's Shop Stewards Conference 2017



An interactive and motivated group of more than 100 Shop Stewards gathered together in solidarity at the Hilton Vancouver Metrotown Hotel in Burnaby on the last weekend in November 2017 to engage in Local 258 IBEW's biennial Shop Stewards Conference.

Recognizing that our Shop Stewards are at the forefront representing our Union and serving our membership in the workplace, Business Manager Doug McKay has assigned a priority to this biannual educational Conference that provides ongoing training for these members who strengthen our Union by participating as Shop Stewards.

Local 258 represents about 4,000 workers in Electric Utility, Private Power Line, Utility Arborist, Manufacturing and Traffic Control industries in the province of BC & the Yukon Territory and has over 300 Shop Stewards who were invited to attend the Conference.

"I was very impressed with the turnout – more than we've had in the past – that saw both recently appointed and very experienced Shop Stewards attending," said Brother McKay, "It was also very good to have our Assistant Business Managers provide leadership with our customized Shop Stewards training course that took up a big portion of this 3-day event."

Numerous highlights framed the

weekend of training and education including a highly valued presentation made by Keynote Speaker, Lieutenant Colonel (retired) Stephane Grenier of Mental Health Innovations based in Ottawa. Grenier gave a passionate presentation about understanding mental health and he spoke frankly about his story and the diagnosis of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder he received while serving in the Canadian Armed Forces. He described the benefits of adding "peer support" to the toolbox of understanding mental health issues and their effects and impact in the workplace, saying "lack of social support is the prominent factor in recovering from mental injury. We need to give a shit."

After his very informative, moving and entertaining one-hour presentation, delegates lined up to chat with Grenier, sharing their own experiences and motivations for becoming involved as a Union Shop Steward. Many described afterwards they had a new and informed understanding about mental health issues as result of Grenier's presentation. Brother Chris Carter emceed the proceedings as an impressive line-up of Guest Speakers made their presentations, including from the First District, International VP Bill Daniels and Kate Walsh, IBEW Canada's Strategic Coordinator. Delegates also heard from International Organizers Martin Duckworth, Dave Priest and Brandon Dyck who gave updates on organizing successes across Western Canada.

Local 258's International Rep., Brother Laird Cronk, provided an informative overview of the history and structure of the IBEW and Local 258. And Brother Aaron Ekman, Secretary-Treasurer of the BC Federation of Labour, brought news about what's happening in BC's labour movement.

Everyone was very pleased to hear powerful words from two strong labour icons serving in the BC government – Deputy Speaker Raj Chouhan and Minister of Labour, the Honourable Harry Bains.



In addition to the important charitable work they've been

doing collecting food, clothing and personal hygiene items for distribution to homeless women in our communities, Committee members have been attending educational meetings and Conferences and some have even, for their first time, stepped into Unit leadership positions in our Union.

"Women's issues are coming to the forefront in the discussions about the challenges our Union faces as we plan for the future," said Sister Nicole Biernaczyk, Chair of the Local 258 IBEW Women's Committee. "We are fortunate that the IBEW and our Local are strong supporters of all women in our Union. By funding us to join

each other at local meetings and at Conferences abroad, we've been able to engage with face-to-face conversations, share our experiences and learn more about the issues that matter to women in our Union, our workplaces and in our communities."

Last November, Canadian women from IBEW Locals across the country gathered in Toronto for the inaugural First District IBEW Women's Conference. This event gave delegates an opportunity to hear from some powerful speakers, participate in productive workshops and raise the bar in setting the agenda for the future. "We try to do what we can to help build the profile of our Sisters in the Brotherhood," said Sister Biernaczyk, who works as the lone female Assistant Business Manager at the Local 258 office and also serves as the First District Representative on the IBEW International Women's Committee. "Our aim is to support women in our Union who want to find ways to identify and address what matters to us and develop ways of enacting effective and workable solutions that will ultimately strengthen our Union as a whole."

Brother Doug McKay, the Local's Business Manager, was one of a group of men who joined the historic meeting in Toronto, said, "It's always good when members want to be more involved in our Union, and I'm impressed with the efforts of our Women's Committee in helping to shine a spotlight on and build the diversity of our Union."

The IBEW has been making great strides to ensure women have a place in our Union and these efforts continued in June of this year when members of Local 258's Women's Committee met in St. Paul, Minnesota, to join with the 600-delegate strong contingent from across Canada and the United States at the "Signalling Success" IBEW Women's Biannual Conference.

This custom-made quilt, put together with pieces of t-shirts and jackets created by a number of IBEW Women's Committees, was raffled off at the "Signalling Success" Conference in St. Paul, Minnesota, and raised over \$2200 that was donated to a local charity. IBEW President Lonnie Stephenson welcomed delegates and spoke about the expanding role of women in our Union, noting the number of women working in the trades has increased 80% over the last 30 years.

Featured workshops and plenaries at the Conference focused on the many pressing issues that matter most to IBEW women, and included

topics on sexual harassment and workplace discrimination; mental health and substance abuse;

leadership development; interpersonal communications; and family-friendly workplace policies.

The Local 258 delegation included Brother Aaron Ekman, Secretary-Treasurer of the BC Federation of Labour, who was very warmly received when he was invited to speak with delegates at the Canadian caucus. Aaron is the partner of Local 258 IBEW Staff Lawyer Natalie Gidora.

"There's always so much energy that comes from getting together at Conferences like these," said Sister Biernaczyk, "We all come back exhausted, but at the same time we're rejuvenated by what we have learned and quickly regain our momentum.

Your Local 258 IBEW Union Dues

Plus IBEW Pension contribution rates for "A" members and information for Participating Withdrawal Card members

Your union dues are, by law, regularly deducted from your paycheque by your employer (known as checkoff) and are then transferred to your Union, Local 258 IBEW.

Dues are composed of a "per capita"* fee plus an additional 1.5% of your gross monthly wage. These monies fund administrative and other costs funded by your Union that provide you with, among other things, quality representation in your workplace, professional contract negotiations and specialized legal services. If you are an "A" member, additional costs are deducted for your contribution to the IBEW Pension Benefit Fund (PBF) and other benefits, including a death benefit for your named survivor.

Members who have been granted a "Participating Withdrawal Card"must keep their per capita fees current, with "A" members also submitting the IBEW PBF contribution.

"A" Members - Effective January 1st 2018: Per Capita fee: \$19.00; IBEW Pension Benefit Fund (PBF) contribution: \$18.00.

"A" Members - Effective January 1st 2019: Per Capita fee: \$19.00; IBEW PBF contribution: increase to \$19.00.

"A" Members - Effective January 1st 2020: Per Capita fee increase to: \$20.00; IBEW PBF contribution: \$19.00.

"BA" Members - Effective January 1st 2018: Per Capita rate: \$19.00; IBEW PBF contribution: not applicable.

"BA" Members - Effective January 1st 2019: Per Capita fee: \$19.00; IBEW PBF contribution: not applicable.

"BA" Members - Effective January 1st 2020: Per Capita fee increase to: \$20.00; IBEW PBF contribution: not applicable.

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Nanaimo's 2017 Safety Rodeo enjoyed by hundreds

The BC Hydro/IBEW 258 Safety Rodeo took place on June 10, 2017 in beautiful Nanaimo on Vancouver Island at the local district training yard with hundreds of spectators including BC Hydro employees and their families joined competitors, judges and all the volunteers to enjoy the day-long event. The weather started out a bit cloudy but soon gave way to the beautiful sunny days that we are famous for.

Fifteen Power Line Technician (PLT) three-member teams and eighteen PLT Apprentices made for the biggest competitor field in the history of the Safety Rodeo. 
Union helps enhance the lives of veterans living with PTSD

After Local 258 IBEW members voted at Unit meetings last year to approve spending funds to sponsor a Certified Service Dog to enhance the life of a veteran living with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), \$10,000 was sent to National Service Dogs (NSD), based in Ontario, to cover the costs associated with training, placement and follow up for the working life of a specialized service dog.

The Union received a letter of thanks in March from Danielle Forbes, Executive Director of the non-profit organization, where she wrote, "This year we will be placing our first two PTSD Service Dogs in British Columbia. The first service dog will arrive in BC in May and the second later this fall. To our clients our dogs are super heroes and we thank you for being part of their journey."

The National Service Dogs organization sent out a "tweet" on their social media account thanking our Union, as well as placing a notice on their Facebook page (see right).

NSD receives no government funding and relies entirely on support from corporate sponsors, local community members, service clubs and annual fundraising events.



2018 Safety Rodeo returns to Surrey campus

A fter months of meticulous planning including an unexpected change of venue for the Welcome Reception, Awards Dinner Banquet and accommodation for out-of-towners just a few weeks before the planned events, the BC Hydro Safety Rodeo took place on June 9, 2018 at the Trades Training and Construction Services yards in Surrey off of 128th Street.

Thousands of BC Hydro employees and their families came through the gates starting at 10 am and were entertained throughout the day with displays from BC Hydro and various exhibitors, including at Local 258 IBEW's tent as we showcased our union. The popular bucket truck rides were a huge attraction for the throngs of spectators.

Thanks to Brother Jim Greenwell, Senior ABM at Local 258 IBEW who staffed our Exhibitor tent, along with ABMs Don McNabb, Dan Klassen, Greg Fanning and Unit Chairs Klaus Kraft and Dean Kotaras.

The Power Line Technician (PLT) Team and Apprentice competitions and the Bare Hand Live Wire demonstrations were the highlight events of the day. Competitors included 24 PLTs (8 teams of three each) and 18 Apprentices overseen by about 40 Judges, Local 258 IBEW members who work at BC Hydro as experienced PLTs. Five PLTs demonstrated Live Wire work at scheduled times throughout the day.


Dear IBEW,

I am writing to the Hotline to say thank you to our Union, Local 258 of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, for the opportunity to be the 2017 Labour Campaign Associate to the United Way of the Lower Mainland (UWLM).

IBEW is a strong supporter of the annual fundraising campaigns that help support the United Way and the important work they do in our communities. Through the 37-year partnership with the Canadian Labour Congress, Unions offer Labour Campaign Associates (formerly referred to as "Loaned Reps"), members who volunteer to serve as an extension of United Way staff to help coordinate fundraising campaigns in their workplaces. This 16-week experience includes training by the United Way, with costs covering wages, a vehicle, a cell phone and a laptop computer funded by the Union – sometimes these costs are covered in partnership with employers.

The United Way's strong relationship with Unions has helped effect social change, improve lives and strengthen communities. We work closely together on many important issues such as access to childcare, poverty reduction, Labour Community Advocate Training and bc211. Three areas the campaign focused on were: moving people from poverty to possibility, helping kids be all they can be, and building strong communities.

Sadly, United Way research has revealed that Seniors are the fastest growing group in our society who are crossing the line to poverty. Rental prices and the shrinking buying power of their pensions are taking their toll. With advancing age, many Seniors are finding themselves isolated as their social circles shrink – more than 25,000 in the lower mainland have stated they do not have a single person to talk to. Changing a light bulb can become an unsafe act and as a result darkness in their homes can create a falling hazard. Many Seniors are being forced to make poor choices and are not getting good nutrition as they are opting to eat fast food for the convenience and cost.

With the UWLM and their partner organizations' focus on building strong communities, more and more Seniors are receiving support with improved access to programs that keep them connected to their communities. Thousands of volunteers are making sure Seniors get to social programs, have nutritious meals delivered to them, and minor house maintenance is getting done. These and other programs are all part of the "keeping people at home longer" philosophy, and with the right help, Seniors can enjoy a higher quality of life and stay longer in their homes.

The UWLM's community partners are observing amazing changes in the Seniors they serve and report increased physical activity, socialization, and improved knowledge and awareness of community resources; they are even more politically and socially engaged! When you are vulnerable, the right connection can literally save your life.

As a current dues paying member of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, you have many options if you find yourself unemployed or out of work. Your first step is to register <u>AS SOON AS POSSIBLE</u> with the Local 258 Dispatch office.

If you choose to seek work outside of the Local 258 IBEW jurisdiction, you will need to obtain a Travel Card that can be issued through the Dispatch office. Travel Cards are valid for a period of three months and are required to be deposited with the IBEW Local in the jurisdiction of your new employment. Has your employer transferred you to work outside of British Columbia?


If your employer has transferred you to work for an extended period of time outside of British Columbia, you may need a Travel Card.

2017 marked 50 years for Local 258 of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers

How it all began...



IBEW Local Union 258 operates under a Charter granted by the International Office dated April 1, 1967

The first Council President was Brother W. Isbister (later an International Representative in BC) and the first Business Manager was Brother Fred Allison.

The Council of IBEW Local Unions met on a regular basis and dealt with negotiations for Hydro Collective Agreements and handled grievances and arbitrations, etc. Notwithstanding the best of intentions, to have five different Local Unions agree on every question of policy was, at best, a fond ideal. Frequent conflicts erupted on issues that threatened individual Local's autonomies.

In 1967, the Council disbanded and the members employed with BC Hydro throughout the province were transferred from their various Locals into the newly created Local 258 that had been issued a Charter by the IBEW on April 1 of that same year. As all members of Local Union 821 were employed by BC Hydro, the transfer into Local 258 caused Local Union 821 to cease to exist. All other Locals continued to serve their members employed by employers other than BC Hydro.

BC Hydro went on to absorb the East Kootenay Power and Light Company, Northern Light and Power Company, the Municipal or City Utilities of Kimberly, Cranbrook and Revelstoke further causing the transfer of members of other IBEW Locals into Local 258.

Since 1898, the privately-owned British Columbia Electric Co. had been providing electric power services to a growing number of cities in British Columbia. In 1945, the government of the day created a new crown corporation, the British Columbia Power Commission, to ensure under-served communities all over the province had access to electric power. By 1961, it had electrified over 200 communities.

That same year, the Socred government of Premier W.A.C. Bennett – focused on their vision to develop the Peace and Columbia River projects to generate hydroelectricity in an effort to attract more industry to the province – bought the BC Electric Co., and, through legislation, amalgamated it with the BC Power Commission and created the publicly-owned BC Hydro and Power Authority, or "BC Hydro".

At that time, many of the workers at both BC Electric and the BC Power Commission were represented by five IBEW Local Unions with Collective Agreements covering their wages and working conditions. Clerical and office staff were represented by the Office and Professional Employees International Union – OPEIU (known today as MoveUp).

The IBEW Locals were 213 in the Lower Mainland, 230 on Vancouver Island, 344 on the North Coast, 993 in Kamloops and the Central Interior 821 in Vernon.

To speak to BC Hydro with one voice, the various IBEW Local Unions formed into the Utility System Council #27 in 1963.

Broadening Our Scope...

Since 1967, the jurisdiction of Local Union 258 has been expanded by the International President to include Utility and Line Clearance Tree Trimming (with the exception of work presently in the jurisdiction of Local Unions 213, 230 and 1003), Outside Line Construction (1988), Traffic Control and Electrical Equipment Service and Electrical Manufacturing work (except that work in the jurisdiction of Local 230), all within the province of British Columbia.

51 years now and counting – congratulations to Local 258 of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers!



INFORMATION FOR LOCAL 258 IBEW MEMBERS

Types of IBEW Membership

There are two types of membership in the IBEW, an "A" membership and a "BA" membership. Local Union 258 covers both the "A" and "BA" types of membership.

"A" Membership

An "A" member is eligible for the IBEW pension and death benefits, and a wider range of employment opportunities with other Local Unions having Construction jurisdiction. Members who employed with Local 258's Outside Line Contractors must be "A" members.

"BA" Membership

"BA" members are not entitled to participate in the benefits described above, nor are they eligible for employment in classifications requiring "A" membership should they attempt to work in the jurisdiction of a different Local than Local 258.

Membership Transfer

The IBEW Constitution provides for "A" and "BA" members to transfer one type of membership to another. To transfer from "A" to "BA," a member must complete the transfer application form in which he/she acknowledges forfeiture of IBEW pension and death benefits.

To transfer from "BA" to "A" members must notify the Union office and remit a fee of \$5.00. Members who transfer membership must retain the changed membership for not less than 12 consecutive months except when change is made necessary on account of transferring to a different type of work.

Unemployed Dues Payments

Unemployed members pay unemployed and/or per capita dues directly to Local 258 IBEW to keep their membership current while seeking employment opportunities through the Local's Dispatch office. It is the responsibility of all members to ensure that their dues are paid up to date and this must be done without receiving any form of reminder from the Union.

Dues Receipts

In February of each year, Local 258 IBEW will mail each member an official tax receipt showing the amount of Union dues paid for the previous year through employer deductions or directly to Local 258 IBEW. This receipt is for your income tax purposes - please make sure your mailing address is always current with Local 258 IBEW.

All "A" members who are working, or unemployed and submitting dues/per capita fees, by mailed cheque, money order or by cash directly to the Union office will also receive an official receipt every two months.

Local 258 Structure

According to the Local 258 IBEW Bylaws and the IBEW Constitution, the Local's Executive Board (E-Board) consists of the President (who serves as Chair), six Unit Chairs and the Business Manager/Financial Secretary. Responsibilities include formulating policy and overseeing the business of the Local.

The Business Manager is responsible for the day-to-day operation of the business of the Local, administration of E-Board policy and of the Collective Agreements between the Union and the employers. The Business Manager appoints Assistant Business Managers and Shop Stewards as he/she deems necessary to assist him/her in the efficient handling of the Local's business. The Business Manager attends and has voice but no vote at the E-Board meetings.

Unit Structure

Local 258 has adopted the Unit structure as provided for in the IBEW Constitution. Each Unit elects the following <u>Officers</u>: Chair (also serves as an E-Board Member), Vice-Chair, and Recorder. The <u>Unit Executive Committee</u> consists of the elected Officers plus two elected members, and are responsible for attending to the business of the Unit and for developing policies they can forward to the E-Board for determination. The Unit Executive is subordinate to the Local 258 E-Board.

Six Units have been established to assist the Local in delivering service to the membership. Your Unit membership is based on your home address. The Units are:

<u>Unit 1 - Terrace, BC (North Coast)</u>: from Burns Lake to the west and north of Bella Coola, including Haida Gwaii; meetings are in Smithers, Terrace, Prince Rupert, Massett and Queen Charlotte City.

<u>Unit 2 - Prince George, BC (Central Interior)</u>: from Burns Lake and north of 100 Mile House, including Bella Coola; meetings are in Prince George, Dawson Creek, Fort St. John, Hudsons Hope, Fort Nelson, Quesnel, Williams Lake, Bella Coola and 100 Mile House.

<u>Unit 3 - Vernon, BC (Southern Interior</u>): the Southern Interior, east from Bridge River and south of Prince George, including the Kootenays; meetings are in Bridge River, Kamloops, Vernon, Revelstoke, Mica, Castlegar, Trail, Cranbrook and Invermere. <u>Unit 4 - Nanaimo, BC (Vancouver Island</u>): Vancouver Island; meetings are in Victoria, Ganges, Duncan, Qualicum, Port Alberni, Nanaimo, Port Hardy, Courtenay and Campbell River, and at other locations from time to time.

<u>Unit 5 - Burnaby, BC (Greater Vancouver)</u>: the Sunshine Coast and in the Lower Mainland, north of the Fraser River to Powell River and east to the Pitt River; meetings are in Burnaby, Sechelt and Powell River.

<u>Unit 6 - Surrey, BC (Fraser Valley)</u>: Fraser Valley and in the Lower Mainland south of the Fraser River and east from Pitt Meadows to Hope; meetings are in Langley and Chilliwack.




